

## Key terms for teaching Literacy

**Phonemes** The smallest units of sound in a language that can change the

meaning of a word.

**Graphemes** The written symbols (letters or groups of letters) that

represent phonemes.

Sound-out words (decodable

words)

Words that can be read by sounding out each grapheme and

blending the sounds together.

Sight words (undecodable

words, heart words)

Words that don't follow regular spelling patterns and need to

be memorized.

Articulators The parts of the mouth and throat used to make speech sounds

(lips, teeth, tongue, palate, vocal chords.).

**Voiced sounds** Speech sounds made with the vocal cords vibrating.

**Unvoiced sounds** Speech sounds made without the vocal cords vibrating.

**Grapheme-phoneme** 

correspondences

The relationships between written symbols (graphemes) and

their corresponding sounds (phonemes).

**Initial, medial, and final**The positions of a grapheme within a word. Initial refers to the

beginning of the word, medial refers to the middle of the word,

and final refers to the end of the word.
